Made from Minerals Poster Contest

The Burlington Gem and Mineral Club (BGMC), in conjunction with its 2024 Champlain Valley Gem, Mineral and Fossil Show in July, is sponsoring a poster contest for all interested middle school students. The theme of this year's show, and the theme of the poster contest, is "Made from Minerals." Participants should choose something in every-day life that is made from minerals - or the elements extracted from minerals - to create a poster depicting this theme.

About Us

The Burlington Gem and Mineral Club is a northern Vermont membership organization open to anyone interested in minerals, fossils, gems, and lapidary crafts. Club activities include presentations by club members and invited speakers, field trips to collect minerals and fossils, members-only auctions, and our Champlain Valley Gem, Mineral and Fossil Show (link: http://www.burlingtongemandmineralclub.org/show.html) held each July.

Made from Minerals

Minerals, rocks, and the elements from which they are formed have always played an important role in human society. From the earliest stone tools of primitive *Homo sapiens* to our modern technologies, we have used rocks and minerals and their elements to accomplish every-day tasks. Today, minerals play an important role in our economy; they can be found in many products we use every day. Minerals are needed to make our homes, cell phones, automobiles, watches, radios, computers . . . even fireworks. For example, the element TIN is an ingredient in modern-day circuit board solders, and CASSITERITE is the mineral from which tin is extracted.

Poster Contest Details

Middle school participants can choose one of two poster types - technical or artistic. For the technical poster, participants should choose something in our economy that is made from minerals (or uses the elements extracted from minerals), research how these minerals/elements are acquired, and present information on their use in an original poster. The artistic poster offers a bit more freedom of expression. If you choose this option, create a colorful and creative poster that captures the theme of this year's contest - Made from Minerals.

Do some library research, dig for those important facts and interesting images, and display your findings in a poster that is original, colorful, informative and factual, and supports the theme of Made from Minerals.

Submission

To be considered for judging, posters must be submitted on the first day of the Champlain Valley Gem, Mineral and Fossil Show, July 20 (doors open at 10:00 AM). All posters submitted will be displayed in our art gallery for the duration of the Show. Unfortunately, posters cannot be returned; all entries become the property of the Burlington Gem and Mineral Club.

Awards

The posters will be judged by the officers of the Burlington Gem and Mineral Club. Three awards will be given - gold, silver, and bronze - in each poster category (artistic or technical). The criterion by which posters will be judged are detailed below (see Technical Rubric AND Artistic Rubric).

The first place winner in each category will earn a one-year membership to the Club. In addition, the top three finishers in each category will receive a fossil or mineral specimen selected by the BGMC. The winners and their posters will also be presented in our award-winning monthly newsletter.

Further Guidelines

To be considered in the competition, the following information must accompany every poster submitted on July 20:

- The poster category chosen (technical or artistic)

Posters should be an original creation presenting information about how minerals (and elements from those minerals) are used in today's economy. Students are encouraged to find something they are personally interested in, and research how minerals make that something possible. The art and information should be presented in a poster no smaller than 8 ½" by 14" (legal sized paper) and no larger than 18" x 24". This is not a school project, but the highest scholastic expectations apply - all resources used should be appropriately cited, information should be presented in the student's own words.
